
But Thanksgiving? How much will our celebrations have to do with giving thanks?

- •Don't Forget—Flush cooling system: Motorists should have the cooling system flushed and new continued on pg 4




## Arrival Chamber Christmas Boutique

coolant installed as recommended by the vehicle manufacturer. Depending on the type of coolant used, it may be necessary every two to five years.

#### **Electrical System**

- •The efficiency of a vehicle battery decreases in colder temperatures. Heading into cold weather, have the vehicle's battery condition tested, especially if the battery is older than three years (AAA Mobile Battery Service will test members' auto batteries at no charge). If the battery has removable caps, make sure the cells are filled to the proper level with distilled water and that all cable connections are tight and that the terminals and clamps are free of corrosion.
- •Don't Forget—Alternator belt: While the battery provides a reserve source of electrical energy, the alternator provides electrical power once the engine is running and it charges the battery. Make sure the alternator belt is properly adjusted. A loose belt is a common cause of a dead battery. While older vehicles require manual belt tightening, late models typically have automatic tensioners—but those can wear out or fail. Also inspect the alternator belt for signs of wear, such as cracks or missing segments on its ribbed underside.

#### Windshield

- •Check the windshield fluid reservoir before the first freeze of the year and use a windshield cleaning solution with antifreeze components. Also, check the operation of the pump and the aim of the sprayers.
- •Don't Forget—Winter wiper blades: Make sure that wiper blades are completely clearing the windshield glass with each swipe. If there are streaks or missed spots, it's time to replace them. During the snow season, consider installing winter wiper blades. These special units wrap the blade in a rubber boot that prevents ice and snow buildup between the glass and blade.

#### Tires

- •If any tire has less than 3/32-inches of tread, it should be replaced. All-season tires work well in light to moderate snow conditions, providing they have adequate tread depth. In areas with heavy winter weather, using snow tires on all four wheels will provide the best winter traction.
- •Don't Forget—Tire pressure: While motorists should check the pressure in their tires at least once a month, they should increase the continued pg 10



We had so many customers that we ran out of supplies. First we ran out of plastic bottles but some industrious little boys raided the recycle bin and brought us a few so we were back in business until we ran out of tape just about 3 p.m. or closing time. A great time was had by all.

The latest project of the Garden Club is helping the Dunlap School replant their raised beds. The Garden Club donated several plants from the plant sale to replant in the beds and there was a preliminary meeting with two teachers to discuss the upkeep of the beds and all the details. More on this next month.

frequency during winter months. As the temperature starts to drop, so will the pressures in the tires—typically 1 PSI for every 10 degrees Fahrenheit. The proper tire pressure levels can be found on a sticker located on the driver's side door jamb. Also, don't forget to check the pressure in the spare.

#### **Brakes**

- •Brakes that already tend to grab or pull on a dry road are likely to lock on ice or snow-covered pavement, resulting in a loss of stopping power and/or steering control. Make sure brakes are in properly working order before winter weather arrives.
- •Don't Forget—Brake fluid flush: Brake fluid absorbs water that collects at low points in the hydraulic system and causes rust, fluid leaks and even brake failure. On vehicles with antilock brakes, moisture in the brake fluid also can damage expensive electro-hydraulic control units. Most manufacturers recommend that the brake system be flushed and new fluid installed every two to three years. Check the owner's manual for the recommended service interval.

## Garden Preparation... It's never too early!

GARDENS in which the soil is heavy can be benefited by fall plowing. If the ground is turned up and left in ridges as it comes from the plow, in October or November, the action of frost on it during the winter will have a decidedly disintegrating effect, and it will be found much more tractable in spring than it would be if freshly plowed. Of course it will need a spring plowing to reduce it to the proper condition for working. This second plowing will put it in very fair shape for immediate use, while a few days' exposure to the combined effects of sun, air, and possibly warm showers, will make it mellower than after two weeks of exposure with only one plowing. This being the case, I would always advise fall plowing for gardens of heavy soil. Another benefit is derived from fall plowing. The larvæ of many worms will be destroyed by frost in the upturned furrows. For this reason, if no other, fall plowing is advisable. But I would not advise fall plowing for the garden whose soil is light and porous. Not that plowing in fall would injure it, but no particular benefit would accrue, and it is just so much unnecessary work.


