About Critter Creek

Critter Creek Wildlife Station is a fully licensed and permitted wildlife rehabilitation station located on a ten-acre ranch complex in the foothills below Kings Canyon National Park. This non-profit (501 c (3)) facility has been in operation for 30 years relying on donations and incomes of those running the facility. Critter Creek is different from the old model of back yard rehabbing. All the nursing, medicating, training, reconditioning, etc. takes place at this one facility. This is the model that the Department of Fish and Game requested we develop. Critter Creek is one of the few facilities in the Central Valley that has met the new caging regulations put in place by the Department of Fish and Game. We are inspected regularly by the Department of Agriculture as part of the requirements for our exhibitors permit. Using permanently injured animals, we conduct wildlife programs for local schools, service organizations, and clubs. We are open to the public on three different open house occasions throughout the year. We arrange field trips with groups upon request.





The Garden Club members are busy getting ready for the annual Crafts & Art Fair which is scheduled for October 2 at the Nature Trail directly behind the Bear Mountain Library in Squaw Valley.

The vendors will fill their booths with beautiful, unusual and hand made items. This is a great time to begin your Christmas shopping. The Garden Club will have a big plant sale at very reasonable prices.

Of course, what is a Fair without food booths? It is fun to grab your food, pull up a chair at the Educational Platform and listen to the music. Who knows, you might see some people out there dancing. The raffle prizes will be: a handmade quilt, Junk Art Bell, a water feature and many more. Tickets are available from any garden club member. Even if you are not interested in all this, come out anyway to meet old friends and make new or just to do some people watching.

When the Nature Trail was constructed in 1995, the Garden Club assumed responsibility for its care and upkeep. To help with expenses the Garden Club has two big fund raisers each year. There is a Spring Garden Tour almost every year which features different gardens in Squaw Valley, Wonder Valley, Dun-

lap, Miramonte, or Pinehurst. This year's Tour will feature Squaw Valley.

At present the themed gardens in the Nature Trail include: a Mediterranean garden, a flower garden, and a succulent garden. In 2007 a large cement pad, the Educational Platform, was installed to provide a place for community events. We are now working toward installing a cover for the platform. In 2008 a dry creek bed with various sizes of rocks was constructed. In 2009 a compost area was completed to make use of all the trimmings from the various gardens.

Each month a group of hard working volunteers, coordinated by Joe Bauernschmidt, meet on Tuesday morning to keep the Nature Trail in good condition.

The Nature Trail is a lovely place for a morning walk and can be reserved for a special party or a garden wedding. Arrangements for a private event can be made with the Librarian. It is meant to be a community place and all are welcome to enjoy it.

Each month beginning again in September the Garden Club will meet on the 3rd Thursday of each month in the Community Center at the Bear Mountain Library. The meetings start with a social time where refreshments are available. Members bring potted plants to be auctioned off at bargain prices. There is almost always a garden related program. It might be a speaker, or a demonstration or a flower arranging class, etc.

Anyone who has an interest in gardening is welcomed to the meetings to just observe or to participate. It's a good group. Come join us.

Tickling

Tickling is an act of evoking involuntary laughter by touching a part of the body. Some parts of the body are more ticklish than the others, the reason for which is still unknown. The Institute of Cognitive Neuroscience in London found that robotic arms used to tickle people are just as effective as human arms. Men and women are just as "ticklish". The most surprising feature that can be experimented personally is that if one tickles oneself, there is no such stimulation or laughter.

Fingerprints

Fingerprints are formed before birth, grow with the growth of hands and help in identification. A History

The American Legion was chartered by Congress in 1919 as a patriotic veterans organization. Focusing on service to veterans, servicemembers and communities, the Legion currently has about 2.6 million members in 14,000 posts worldwide. These posts are organized into 55 departments: one each for the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, France, Mexico and the Philippines

The American Legion's national headquarters is in Indianapolis, with an office in Washington, D.C. The national organization has a full-time staff of about 300 employees. The Legion has several standing national commissions and committees that work with department, district and post leadership to develop programs, increase membership and recruit volunteers. Associated organizations are the American Legion Auxiliary and Sons of The American Legion.

Over the years, The American Legion has founded many programs for children and youth, including American Legion Baseball and Boys Nation.

Significant dates in American Legion history:

1919

March 15-17 ~ Members of the American Expeditionary Force convene in Paris for the first American Legion caucus.

May 8-10 \sim St. Louis Caucus. "The American Legion" is adopted as the organization's official name. The Legion's draft preamble and constitution are approved.

June 9 \sim The National Executive Committee adopts the Legion emblem.

Sept. $16 \sim \text{U.S.}$ Congress charters The American Legion.

Nov. 10-12 ~ First American Legion convention convenes in Minneapolis. Constitution and preamble are adopted. Delegates vote 361-323 to locate the Legion's national headquarters in Indianapolis instead of Washington. A resolution is passed in support of Boy Scouts of America. Today, the Legion is the chartering agency for more than 1,700 Scouting units comprised of approximately 64,000 youths.

Aug. 9, 1921 ~ The American Legion's efforts result in the creation of the U.S. Veterans Bureau, forerunner of the Veterans Administration. Today, the Legion continues to lobby for adequate funding to cover medical, disability, education and other veterans benefits. June 15, 1923 ~ The first "Flag Code" is drafted during a Legion conference in Washington. Congress adopts the code in 1942. Today, the Legion is at the forefront of efforts to pass a constitutional amendment to protect the U.S. flag from physical desecration. July 17, 1925 ~ The Legion creates the American Legion Baseball program. Currently, more than 50 percent of Major League Baseball players are graduates of the program. About 100,000 youths play on Legion-sponsored teams each year.

June 23, $1935 \sim$ The first American Legion Boys State convenes in Springfield, III., to help youths gain an understanding of the structure and operation of the federal government. The first Boys Nation, bringing together youth leadership from all the Boys State programs, con-

venes in 1946.

June 1, $1938 \sim$ The final round of The American Legion's first annual National High School Oratorical Contest is conducted in Norman, Okla. Today, more than 25,000 high-school students from around the country compete annually in the contest, which promotes a greater understanding of the U.S. Constitution. Winners receive thousands of dollars in college scholarships.

Dec. 15, 1943 ~ Former National Commander Harry W. Colmery starts to write in longhand, on Mayflower Hotel stationery in Washington, the first draft of what will later become the "GI Bill of Rights" — considered to be the Legion's single-greatest legislative achievement.

June 22, 1944 ~ President Franklin D. Roosevelt signs into law the original GI Bill, or Servicemen's Readjustment Act", ushering in monumental changes in U.S. society. Higher education becomes democratized after 8 million veterans go to school on the GI Bill, get better jobs, buy houses in the suburbs and raise families. For every dollar spent on educating veterans, the U.S. economy eventually gets \$7 back. May 29, 1946 ~ The Legion and its Auxiliary present a small, struggling organization called the American Heart Association with a \$50,000 grant. The grant inaugurates a nationwide program for the study, prevention and treatment of rheumatic heart disease.

May 4, $1950 \sim$ The Legion votes to contribute funds to the field of mental health, thereby playing a key role in launching the National Association for Mental Health.

July 9, $1954 \sim$ The American Legion Child Welfare Foundation is formed. Since then, \$10 million has been awarded to youth organizations and projects designed to help America's children.

1960s

Sept. 1, 1966 ~ The Legion voices great concern over the fate of prisoners of war in Vietnam. Today, the Legion urges a full accounting of prisoners of war and troops missing in action. The Legion has formed a special group from among the nation's major veterans organizations to continue pressing for further resolution of this issue.


Aug. 24, $1969 \sim \text{The Legion's National Executive Committee establishes the National Emergency Fund as a result of the effects of Hurricane Camille.$

1970s

May 1, $1972 \sim$ The Legion implements a Halloween safety program for children; it remains the only national program of its kind. April 1, $1975 \sim$ The American Legion-sponsored Freedom Bell goes on board the Freedom Train during its tour of the country, in celebration of the U.S. Bicentennial. Six years later, the Freedom Bell is dedicated at its permanent home in Columbus Plaza, opposite Union Station in Washington.

1980s

Aug. 26, 1982 ~ The Legion presents a \$1 million check to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund for construction of "The Wall" in Washington, becoming the largest single contributor to the project.









A History continued

July 21, 1983 ~ The Legion announces its sponsorship of an independent study on the effects of exposure to Agent Orange on Vietnam War veterans. Congress receives the results of The American Legion-Columbia University Study of Vietnam-Era Veterans in 1989.

Jan. 1, 1989 ~ The Veterans Administration is elevated to cabinet-level status as the Department of Veterans Affairs. The Legion fought hard for the change, arguing that veterans deserve representation at the highest levels of government.

Oct. 16, 1989 ~ The long-standing objective of the Legion to improve adjudication procedures for veterans' claims is achieved when the U.S. Court of Veterans Appeals becomes operational. Most of the provisions contained in the law creating the court were originally included in Veterans Reassurance Act, written by the Legion and introduced in Congress in 1988.

Aug. 2, $1990 \sim$ The Legion files suit against the federal government for failure to conduct a Congress-mandated study about the effects of Agent Orange on veterans who served in Vietnam.

Oct. 11, 1990 ~ The Legion creates the Family Support Network to assist families of servicemembers deployed for operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm in the Middle East. Through local posts, the Family Support Network offers a wide range of assistance, including financial assistance, mowing lawns, baby-sitting and more. Today, the network continues to assist the families affected by military activation and deployment..

June 15, 1991 \sim The Legion hosts its first annual Junior Shooting Sports National Air Rifle Championships at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo. Each year, more than 600 high-school students enter the contest, which teaches gun safety and marksmanship.

Aug. 24, $1994 \sim$ The Legion announces creation of the Citizens Flag Alliance, a coalition of organizations and individual citizens united to work for a constitutional amendment to protect the U.S. flag from desecration. Since 1995, the amendment has passed in the House by an super majority six times: in 1995, 1997, 1999, 2001, 2003 and 2005. In 2006, the amendment fell one vote short of passage in the Senate.

Oct. 1, 1995 \sim The Legion forms its Persian Gulf Task Force to enhance service for the newest generation of wartime veterans, thousands of whom suffer from illnesses linked to their service in the region.

Sept. 16, 1996 \sim The American Legion awards a \$20,000 college scholarship to each of the 10 inaugural Samsung American Legion high school scholars..

June 11, 1997 \sim The National Emergency Fund surpasses the \$1 million mark in cash grants given to flood victims who belong to the Legion family. Most grant recipients reside in the flood plains of Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, Minnesota and North Dakota.

Sept. 3, 1997 ~ The Legion presents its first National Law Enforcement Officer of the Year award to Cpl. William T. Rhodes of Huntington, Pa., at the 79th National Convention in Orlando, Fla.

March 29, 2000 ~ Senate Joint Resolution 14, the constitutional amendment that would return the people's right to protect the U.S. flag from desecration, falls four votes short of the necessary 67 to override a presidential veto.

Nov. 2002 ~ The American Legion launches the national "I Am Not A Number" campaign to identify and document the delays veterans

face in obtaining medical care from the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Aug. 2005 ~ Delegates at the 87th National Convention unanimously voice their support for the global war on terrorism with Resolution

June 30, 2008 ~ President George W. Bush signs into law the Post 9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Act, a new GI Bill strongly supported by the Legion. The bill renews the federal government's commitment to veterans by providing them with substantially better education benefits. The Legion remains at the forefront of efforts to improve education and other benefits for all veterans. The Post 9/1 I GI Bill took effect Aug. 1, 2009, and sent an unprecedented number of veterans to college.
